At Volunteer Nepal, there is no "typical" volunteer profile. Our volunteers are drawn from a broad spectrum of ages, personalities, occupations, and backgrounds and each volunteer has his or her own reasons for electing to take this incredibly rewarding journey. While they are with us, our volunteers engage in a wide range of activities, which vary according to their skills and interests. Notwithstanding the immense diversity within this group, most share a common experience: The children of Nepal Orphans Home embed themselves in our hearts and continue whispering in our ears long after we have departed. Sometimes they softly, but insistently, call us back and we are powerless to refuse to return to them.

Some of our Boards' members first connected with Nepal Orphans Home as ordinary individuals who made life-changing decisions to spend time volunteering in Nepal. This summer, our children summoned home two of them: Jesse Bach, a member of our Board of Advisers and Marcie Westphalen, a member of our Board of Directors.



Jesse is a teacher whose volunteer experience moved him to help save a number of enslaved girls by organizing warm and magical fundraisers.
