We have invited the US Ambassador to Nepal and a few Nepali dignitaries who have come to know our work well, and a representative of the foundation that made the creation of this building possible.



UPDATE: CHELSEA EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY CENTER

The Chelsea Education and Community Center continues to bustle with opportunities for the children of NOH as well as 250 local women. Since I assumed the role of Director of the Chelsea Center last September, I have seen firsthand how much our workshops and special programming have expanded and become an integral part of the community.



Highlights for Papa's House children at Chelsea Center

- **Hour of Code:** For two weeks during winter break, CECC teacher NOH Ashok Yadav and I helped students in grades 4 through 9 participate in the "Hour of Code" program, which gives students from around the world access to learning the fundamentals of coding.
- **Grades 1 to 3 Join the Chelsea Center:** In January, NOH kids in grades 1 through 3 began coming to the Chelsea Center to practice their math skills on XtraMath and Khan Academy. The younger kids are excited to be a part of the Chelsea Center classes and to use the computers!
- **Irish Dancing:** Returning volunteer Cora Summerville led 20 NOH children and young adults in an Irish dancing lesson. Irish dancing certainly requires a focus on precise movements as well as a quickness of foot, and many of our children took to it well!

- **Creative Writing Workshop:** Long-time returning volunteer Emma McDonald led a writing workshop with students in grades 6 through 9. This workshop comprised of four writing stations: 1) finishing a story about an intruder, 2) writing a six-word story, 3) writing about all the sensory experiences associated with the small candy Centerfruit, and 4) writing about a robo-bird.

Welcome Back Party: After the Dashain vacation, the Chelsea Center threw a party to welcome its members back for regular classes. The party consisted of speeches made by students and staff, an award ceremony, biscuits and tea, games and dancing. The highlight of the event was when the most senior member of the Chelsea Center (72 years old!) recited poetry.

New classes for the women of the Chelsea Center: In the past couple of months, we have offered three new computer classes led by Ashok Yadav and three new tailoring classes led by the tailoring girls Sanu and Amrita.

Empowerment through Financial Independence: One of our aims at the Chelsea Center is to empower local women through education. Since women's empowerment comes from not only education but also financial independence, we have hosted both a "personal finance" workshop and an "entrepreneurship workshop" for the women.

Volunteer Spotlight: The Lure of Adventure

"Himal do you actually know where we are?" I asked nervously. The sun was setting and it was starting to get below 10 degrees. We made our way into a forest, the wind was rustling the leaves overhead and the endless amount of trees made getting our bearings impossible. This was on the way to my second placement at the nunnery in Bigu.

It was the first time I was ever scared in my two months in Nepal. Himal and I were fully ready to sleep in the jungle. We brought supplies that made our packs so much heavier than they should have been. I'll never forget how we stumbled into Bigu, exhausted but relieved. We both burst into laughter when we received our tea.

The hike to Bigu was a welcome addition to the amazing memories I've made in Nepal. Exploring the snaking streets of Kathmandu. Serving hundreds of the city's homeless in Durbar square. Waking up at 4AM to see the first rays of light hit Annapurna at Poon Hill. Actively seeking out tigers while walking through the Chitwan Jungle. Dancing in front of 30,000 people at an elephant festival and teaching soldiers an Australian children's dance.

All these experiences, and so many more, have affected me so deeply in the most positive way imaginable. I have made such great connections with the other volunteers and the local Nepali people. The Nepalese people are honestly the most selfless, dependable and kind-hearted people you will ever meet, and they will go above and beyond to make you feel welcome.

The majority of my time was spent outside of the valley during my volunteer placements. I spent two weeks in the barren village of Ramechhap teaching English to primary school children in a glorified shed. My other placement was in Bigu, teaching nuns surrounded by the titanic Himalayas.

I won't lie, these placements are challenging. Many times I thought of throwing in the towel and coming back to the relative comfort of Kathmandu. It's the extraordinary people that keep you in these placements. Also knowing that you are benefiting these small communities in such a positive way is a major accomplishment in itself.

Nothing that's ever worth doing is simple. The stories and connections I have made I will treasure forever. Nepal will always hold a special place in my heart.

So I call on all people across the globe who read this, from the seasoned adventurer or armchair explorers, to open their hearts and minds to the amazing place that is Nepal. Let the people welcome you with open arms. If there is one thing bigger than Everest, it's the kind hearts of the people of Nepal.

My last piece of advice is just to surrender yourself to the experience, leap first - then open your eyes later. Never say "no" to a potentially awesome adventure. No matter how trivial the task is, I guarantee it will be a golden opportunity waiting to happen!
